

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Hike of the Month: Black Point Summit

Black Point always has a lot to offer the intrepid hiker and like all parts of the mountain, changes dramatically according to season. While Spring offers the most diversity in terms of plant life, Fall can be a great time to visit also. There are two ways to approach this hike, clockwise or counter-clockwise. Each direction has its benefits and drawbacks.

This hike starts from Mitchell Canyon and is roughly 5 miles and 1,200 feet of climbing. While I hike it often, a particular visit to Black Point in late September of last year was memorable. Rain occasionally occurs in late Fall and that particular day it came hard, and sideways! While a group of us headed up the trail despite the conditions, I remember thinking I was going to be disappointed. September is prime Tarantula mating season and this trail is known for them, but they typically don't like rain.

Despite the fact that we often tell visitors you won't see our 8-legged friends in a downpour I trudged on. Traversing up the steep and exposed slope on counter-clockwise approach to the Black Point Summit Trail rain, fog and wind buffeted us. Just after the turn to climb the summit, a rain-soaked tarantula was lazily crossing my path. I was so excited when I looked at the photos at the end of the day, little beads of rain dotted the spider's body!

On sunnier days you may smell breakfast...the subtle aroma of maple syrup accompanies our California Everlasting. A gentle rub of the dried flower may give you a hankering for a stack of pancakes. Or if you are here toward the end of the day, you will often catch glimpses of bright pink and orange reflections of the sunset bouncing off of nearby Black Diamond Mines to the east.


If you're looking to see some Tarantulas, come out early in the day or late in the evening. You are bound to see them both on Black Point trail as well as on Globe Lily trail. Just keep a keen eye out as they are often crawling along the rocky/grassy trail sides in addition to the middle of the trail. These are delicate and precious creatures, only capture them with your camera...touching them is strictly prohibited.







California Everlasting by Steve Smith




Black Diamond Sunset by Steve Smith



Black Diamond hike map



While the rancho boundaries were being surveyed, plans were underway to begin subdividing federal land in the territory in accordance with the United States Public Land Survey System (USPLSS). The procedure for land surveys under the USPLSS was to establish a starting point, called

an "initial point," which becomes the intersection of true ast/west, and north/south direction lines.

Park Update: North Gate Road closure extended




